ATTENDANCE

- School buildings will open at 7:15
- Students will enter the classroom at 7:45
- Students are considered tardy at 7:55
- Doors will be locked from 7:55-3:35
- Official Attendance Time is 9:30
- Please send a note within two school days when your child has been absent.
- Please limit the number of times your child is checked out early. After 2:45, the office is preparing for dismissal; therefore, students may not be checked out during this time. Every moment of their school day is important to their success.

CELL PHONES & ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Technology integration is a focus on our campus, but we recognize that children need to be taught how to properly use it. Students may bring their devices including smart watches to school each day as long as they are labeled with a first and last name, but will be required to turn them in to their teacher until it is time to use them. Students are not to use them for non-academic reasons and their use must be approved by a staff member. The school is not responsible for any lost or broken electronic devices.

Devices used for other purposes will be confiscated immediately and the following fees will be charged:

- First offense: Student conference with teacher or administrator and student may collect
- Second offense: \$15 fine and parent must pick up
- Third offense: \$15 fine and student is no longer permitted to bring personal electronics to school

Any items that are not picked up after 30 days of the last day of school will become property of Hallsville Intermediate School.

BEHAVIOR

- **POSITIVE PROACTIVE BEHAVIOR PLAN**

Hallsville Intermediate School believes that students must be recognized when they exhibit positive behavior. HIS provides a variety of ways through which students can be recognized for doing good things for other people. These things can include but are not limited to: helping others when they need help, using proper manners, letting a teacher know about a problem, exhibiting improvement in grades or behavior, and performing any other positive behavior.

The following are rewards and incentives given to encourage Exemplary academics, attendance, and behavior:

- **Bobcat Buck Store** –Students who exhibit exceptional behavior and work ethic will receive Bobcat Bucks to purchase from the Bobcat Store.
- **H.I.S. Going the Extra Mile (G.E.M.)** – Students are nominated by staff to be recognized during announcements for exhibiting great character. These students will also get to sign the “G.E.M.” board displayed in the front of the school.
- **9 Week Rewards** – Special rewards designed for students who:
 - 80% or above in conduct
 - Have not been to ISS, OSS, or DAEP
 - Are passing all classes
 - Have been in attendance at least 90% of days
 - Are cleared from late library books or library fees
- **CONSEQUENCES**
 - **Classroom Star Systems**
 - Each student gets a fresh start with 3 stars every Thursday morning
 - Subtracting Stars
 - Students will lose their first star after the student signs traffic ticket log **twice**.
 - Students will lose another star after student signs traffic ticket log again or receives an additional mark.
 - After 4 marks or signings, then the student has no more stars for the week.
 - Students needing persistent redirection for misbehavior may be placed on an individualized plan.
 - Teachers update Star Behavior Tracker on Thursdays to be sent home in purple folders

- Office referrals will result in deduction of points from the overall numerical conduct grade
 - 9-week conduct grade on report card = (# of stars earned / # of stars possible for the 9 weeks) - any points deducted from office referrals x 100
- **Lunch Detention**
Lunch detention can be assigned to a student by a teacher or an administrator as a consequence for minor behavior infractions. Students will be offered the same lunch as other students but will be required to eat in a different location, away from the usual free seating choices. Items considered by the Department of Agriculture to be of “minimal nutritional value” will not be allowed (ex. Soda, cookies, ice cream, candy, etc).
 - **In-School Suspension (ISS)**
ISS can be assigned to a student by an administrator as a consequence for violating the Code of Conduct. If a student is assigned ISS, he/she may bring a lunch or purchase lunch from our cafeteria. Items considered by the Department of Agriculture to be of “minimal nutritional value” will not be allowed (ex: soda, cookies, ice cream, candy, etc).
 - **Out of School Suspension (OSS)**
District Alternative Educational Placement (DAEP)
OSS or DAEP can be assigned to a student by an administrator as a consequence for violating the Code of Conduct.

Awards Assembly in May – Recognizes the Billie Martin Award (A in all classes for the first three nine weeks), A/B Honor Roll, Perfect Attendance (official attendance), Teachers may also do additional awards for their classroom and family.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS/LATE WORK

- Zeros will be used to hold the places of missed assignments, but we will not allow students to refuse to do work.
 - Parents will be notified in Skyward and teacher communication when a student receives a zero in the gradebook.
- If the student fails to complete the assignment, the student may complete the work during recess.
- Supports at school will be provided to assist if necessary
- Privileges will be lost until work is completed
- Points will not be deducted for late work
- At the end of each marking period a zero may stand if **all** HISD guidelines have been followed (parent communication, intervention, lost privileges, etc.)

DRESS CODE

- a. Students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean, neat and will not be a health or safety hazard to themselves or others.
- b. Students are expected to dress or groom themselves in clothes and accessories that are appropriate for school activities, including, but not limited to rubber soled shoes for physical education.
- c. The district and or campus shall deem inappropriate any article of clothing, jewelry, body decoration, hair color or hairstyle extreme enough to create a distraction or disturb the normal routine of school, including gang-related items and obscene, provocative and suggestive symbols. Bandanas are not permitted to be worn at school.
- d. Students may not wear jewelry in nose, brow, lip, or any piercing other than the ears.
- e. Students may not wear any inflammatory symbol, emblem, picture, word or slogan, including racial or drug-related items that may create a disruption of school.
- f. Students may not wear low cut shirts, tank-tops, spaghetti straps, (shoulder straps must be at least two inches wide), racer-back or strapless clothing, clothing that exposes bare mid-drifts, excessively torn clothing or excessively loose clothing that results in sagging.
- g. Dresses, skirts and shorts must be no shorter than 3" above the top of the knee. Jeans or leggings that are sheer or have holes 3 inches above the knee are not permitted.
- h. Students must have appropriate coverage when wearing leggings, tights or spandex pants.
- i. Students shall not wear any article of clothing that covers the face, including dark glasses unless prescribed by a physician and documented on file in the nurse's office.
- j. The District discourages the wearing of expensive jewelry and other apparel and is not responsible for lost or stolen items.
- k. Teachers, coaches or sponsors may define appropriate dress for school-sponsored trips and extracurricular activities.
- l. Campus principal has the authority to make decisions regarding dress code that are not outlined in the Student Code of Conduct.
- M. No blankets at school; bring a jacket.

If the principal determines that a student's grooming or clothing violates the school's dress code, the student will be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student may be assigned to in-school suspension for the remainder of the day, until the problem is corrected, or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school. Repeated offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action in accordance with the Student Code of Conduct. Hallsville ISD Student Handbook Page 45.

FOOD

Any outside food brought in for parties or birthdays must be store bought so that ingredients can be verified for students with allergies. Classrooms with severe allergies will be marked.

LIBRARY

- Students have the right to: check out two books and one magazine from our libraries and to use the library before school for homework, reading, book exchange and AR testing.
- Interlibrary loan (ILL): Occasionally, students at HIS want a book that is not a part of the HIS collection or it is already checked out. On a very limited basis, that book may be borrowed from another library in HISD. However, if the requested book is not one that is reviewed by professional sources as being written for the ages of HIS students, a parent must provide a signed note requesting the book that includes the book title and the student's name.
- Library Website:The library has a dedicated website (library.hisd.com) that enables students to search for books and to use databases for school assignments or just for fun. Should a user name/password be needed for a research tool/database, use Hallsville/75650 for all except for TumbleBooks. That username/password is: Hallsville/books.The HIS library also has a page on the Hallsville ISD webpage: www.hisd.com. Select the Intermediate campus and look for the library page to see photos, class calendar, etc.
- Lost or damaged library books: Students who lose or damage library books will be asked to pay for that book so it can be replaced. Payments may be made in cash or by check and those payments may be made over time without affecting a student's right to check out books. If it is not financially possible for a family to pay for a lost or damaged book, please contact the library for assistance. Failure to start payments or return lost books may result in reduced library privileges and loss of 9 weeks reward.

PARENT PICK-UP/DROP-OFF PROCEDURES

- **Office opens at 7:30**
- Drop off time 7:15-7:45. After 7:55, students are tardy and should be taken to the front office
- Pick up time is 3:35-4:00.
- Parents/guardians must stay in their vehicle and **MUST** have a car tag to retrieve their child. If a car tag is not available, you must go to the front office to retrieve your child.
- Students are not allowed to walk to adjacent parking lots to enter or exit a vehicle.
- Parents/guardians are not allowed to walk up to the pick up area to retrieve their student(s).
- Please refer to the traffic flow map. A colored copy will also be available to pick up in both Intermediate offices.
