10 Warning Signs that a Student in your Class May Have Dysgraphia

Does the student:

- 1. Have trouble with shape-discrimination and letter spacing?
- 2. Have trouble organizing words on the page from left to right or have words and letters that run together?
- 3. Have trouble getting ideas down on paper quickly or copying quickly?
- 4. Have a hard time understanding the rules of games or following directions?
- 5. Have trouble understanding spelling rules or telling if a word is misspelled, but can spell correctly orally?
- 6. Mix upper and lowercase letters, blend cursive and print, erase a lot, and have trouble reading their own handwriting?
- 7. Have a hard time holding a pencil correctly, tracing, cutting food, tying shoes, doing puzzles, texting and keyboarding?
- 8. Hold his wrist, arm, body or paper in an awkward position when writing?
- 9. Doesn't know how to use punctuation (ex. overuse commas, mixing up verb tenses)?
- 10. Have trouble writing a story (ex. Starting in the middle, left out/too much information), but can tell a story orally?

Dysgraphia: What is it NOT?

- Evidence of a damaged motor nervous system
- Part of a developmental disability that has fine motor deficits
- Secondary to a medical condition
- Associated with generalized developmental motor or coordination difficulties
- Impaired spelling or written expression with typical handwriting
