

11 Warning Signs That a Student in Your Class May Have Dyslexia

Does the student:

- 1. Have difficulty learning the names of letters and their sounds?
- 2. Struggle to understand that sounds can be represented by letters or groups of letters?
- 3. Have trouble hearing and manipulating the sounds in words, such as deleting sounds from words?
- 4. Read slowly and inaccurately?
- 5. Consistently misread and misspell words?
- 6. Have difficulty remembering how to spell words over time?
- 7. Read a word correctly on one line but then fail to recognize it later in the text?
- 8. Have trouble maintaining attention during literacy activities and show a dislike or reluctance toward reading?
- 9. Fail to make expected progress, even when provided with extra help?
- 10. Have average or above-average abilities in other areas?
- 11. Have a family member with dyslexia or difficulties with reading and writing?

What Dyslexia Is Not:

- It is **not** seeing letters or words backwards.
- It is **not** seeing letters jump on the page.
- It is **not** a visual processing problem corrected by a colored overlay.
